In Guatemala, ROMP operates a permanent clinic in Guatemala City, a nationwide Community-Based Rehabilitation (CBR) program, and a mobile clinic that reaches remote parts of Guatemala and surrounding countries.

2025 numbers:

- Staff members: 15
- Patient appointments: 4,250
- Prosthesis deliveries: 432
- CBR graduates: 175

2025 achievements:

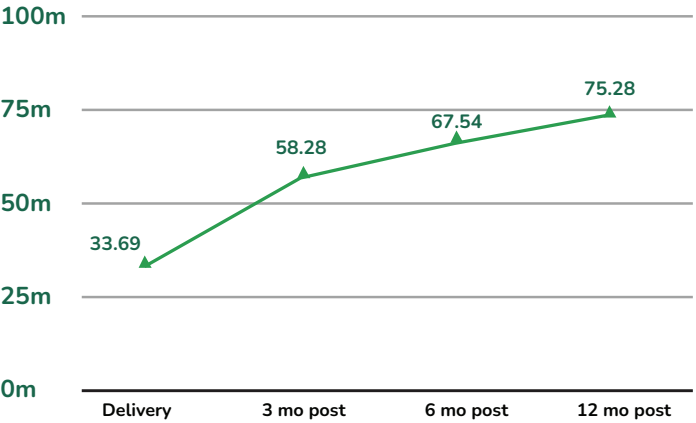
- Launched On-the-Go, a mobile clinic capable of producing prostheses on-the-spot in underserved regions.
- Expanded the Community-Based Rehabilitation program to serve more patients than ever before.
- Created a mental health program for patients, including psychology services and a mental health guide.

This data is pulled from the outcome measures we take with all patients, specifically our CBR patients.

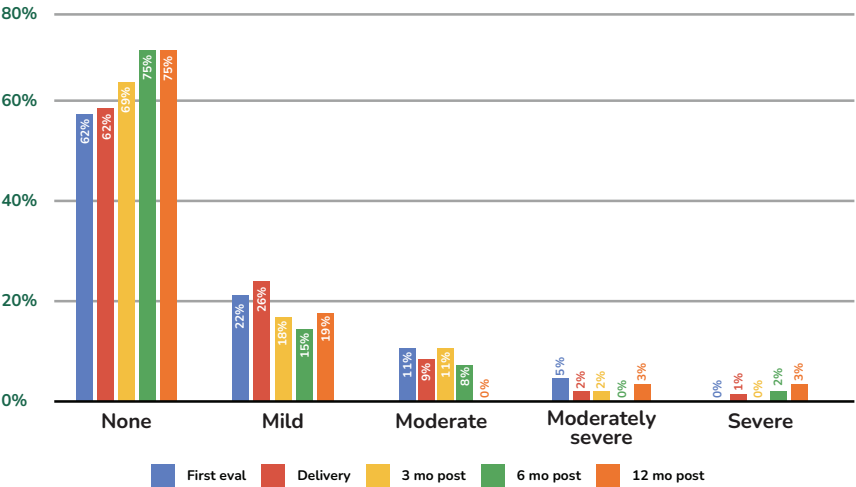
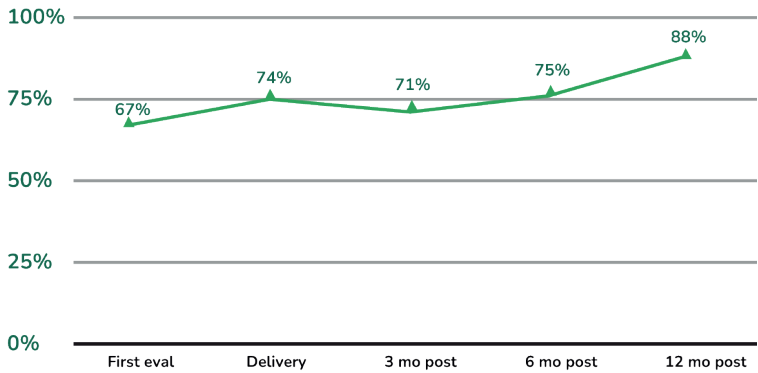


Walking:

From delivery to 12 months later, the average distance walked in 2 minutes increases 123%. (2MWT)

Working:

From first evaluation to 12 months post-delivery, the percentage of patients who have worked increases 21%. (LSMS)



Well-being:

From first evaluation to 12 months post-delivery, the percentage of patients with no clinical depression increases 13%. (PHQ-9)

In Ecuador, ROMP operates a permanent clinic in Quito, a mobile clinic that traverses the entire country, and a satellite clinic and Community-Based Rehabilitation (CBR) program in the Ecuadorian Amazon.

2025 numbers:

- Staff members: 8
- Patient appointments: 1,856
- Prosthesis deliveries: 352
- CBR graduates: 7

2025 achievements:

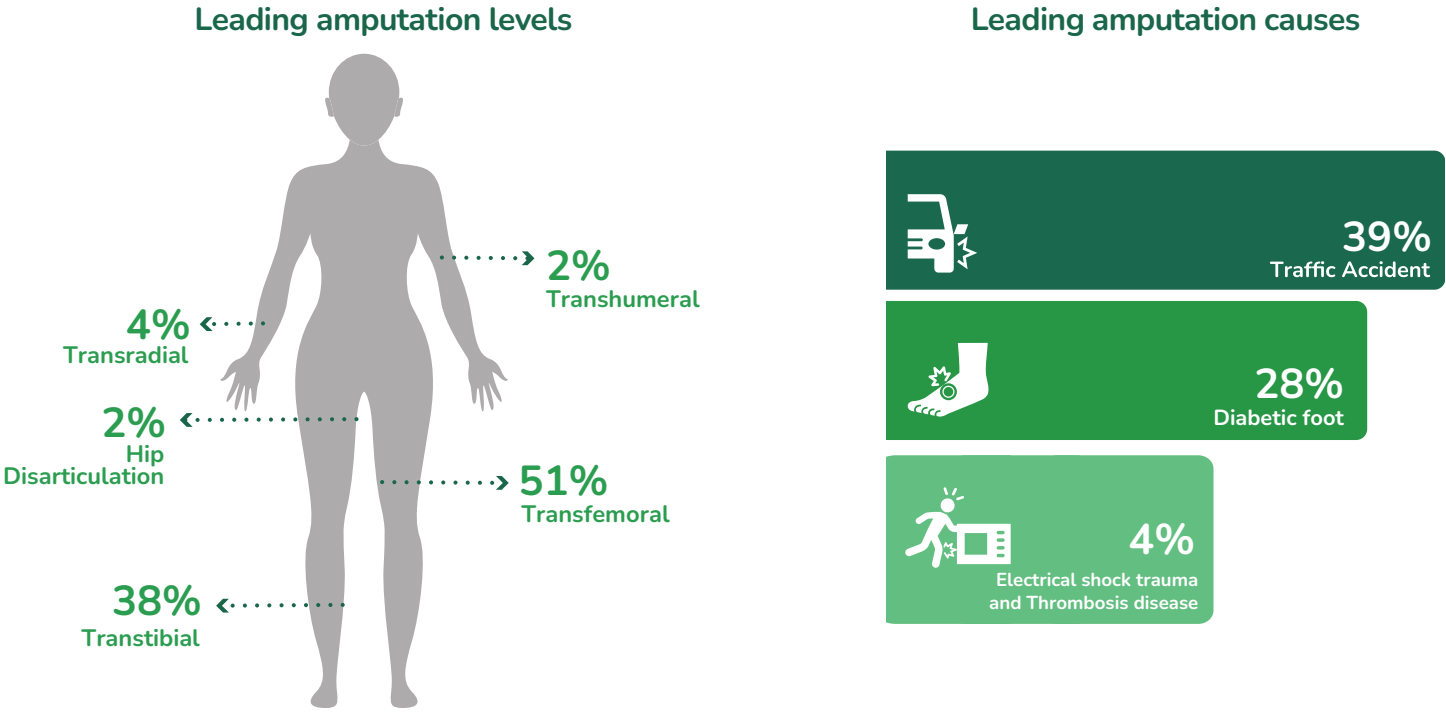
- Launched Community-Based Rehabilitation for children, focusing on care and inclusion.
- Expanded mobile clinic operations in the coastal region, in partnership with local governments.
- Integrated physical therapy, psychology, and livelihood development services into the team.

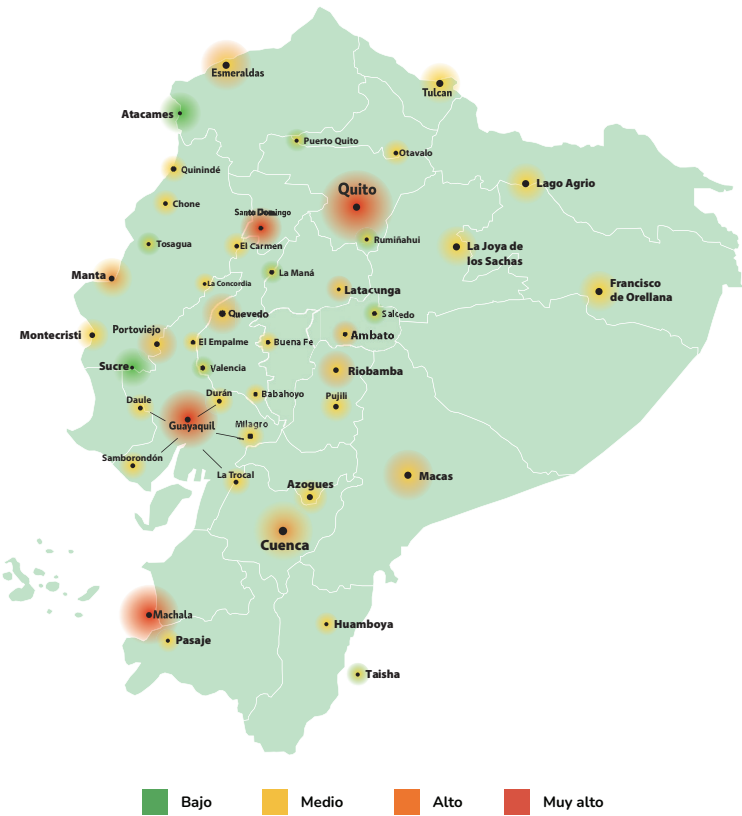

In the United States, ROMP operates a nationwide component recycling program supplying 95% of our clinics' needs, including our global warehouse in Denver and numerous Limb Disassembly Days.

2025 numbers:

- Staff members: 9
- Traveling volunteers: 103
- Components recycled: 7,702 lbs

2025 achievements:

- Carried out six Limb Disassembly Days across the United States, involving community partners.
- Secured support for a three-year project to share MoviliApp with rehabilitation organizations worldwide.
- Piloted innovative technologies like the Amparo socket and the Circleg system for more efficient care.

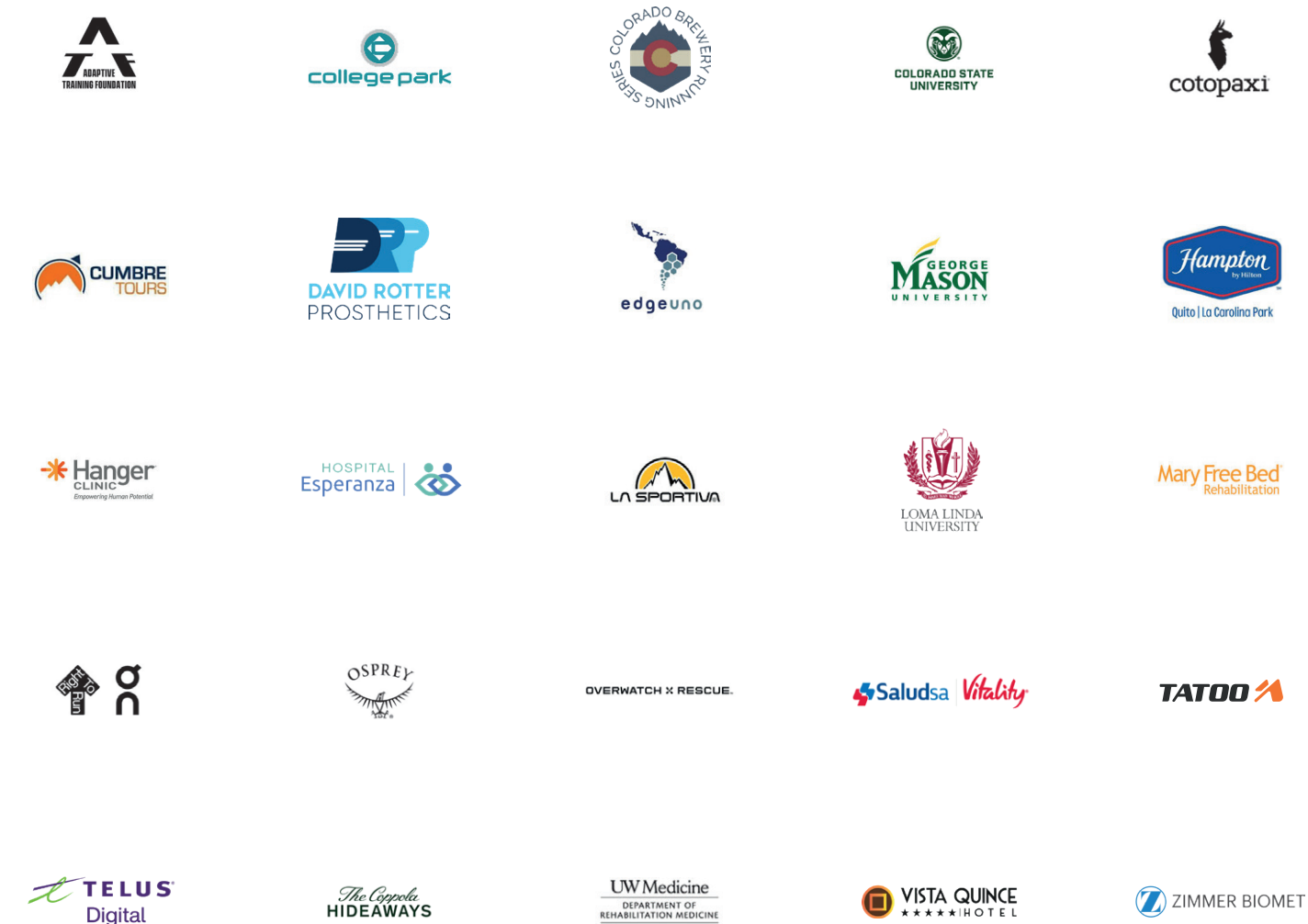
